# Parent prompt

## Supporting info

- There is an increased chance of young children emerging from between or behind vehicles parked near schools, particularly before and after school. Their size and unpredictable behaviour makes it more difficult for drivers to see them.
- By dropping off or picking up children at inappropriate locations drivers place all children in the vicinity, including their own, at risk.
- Parking restrictions around schools are usually specifically designed to improve the safety of pedestrians, and minimise traffic congestion.
- Fines and penalties apply for failure to comply with road laws, and are subject to annual review.
- During school days, many school aged pedestrian fatalities and casualties occur between 8 and 9 am and 3 and 4 pm, when children are typically going to and from school.



# Pick Up and Drop Off Zone (Kiss and Drop Facility)

### What is a Pick Up and Drop Off Zone?

This is a designated area that is usually located near pedestrian exit gates on the school side for drivers to pick up children or drop them off.

#### What does a Pick Up and Drop Off Zone look like?

- It can be located as an indented bay or along the school's kerb side
- A Red, Black and White sign will clearly identify the designated zone.



#### How does it work?

During school "Start and Finish" times, this area is for dropping and picking up of students only and not for parking for longer periods.

- "No Parking" signs apply at the Pick Up and Drop Off Zone (see definition).
- NO PARKING: The driver of a vehicle must not stop in a NO PARKING area, unless stopping for the immediate purpose of picking up or dropping off

passengers or goods. The driver must remain with the vehicle and take no more than 2 minutes.



- If you are the first driver in line, please pull up to the start of the pick up line, enabling others to draw in behind your vehicle.
- When lining up, please don't block off any Car Park exit (if applicable).
- If the driver needs to leave the vehicle, or your child is not waiting in the Pick Up and Drop Off Zone, the driver should park in the allocated parking provided around the school – not the Pick Up and Drop Off Zone.

## Hints for drivers parking around schools:

- Slow down near schools, shops and parked cars as there is a greater chance that a child could run out from between parked cars.
- Ensure your children enter via the safety door. This is the door on the left-hand side next to the pavement away from the traffic.

Avoid double parking:



#### How you can help:

- Teach your child to wait on the footpath within the Pick Up and Drop Off Area, and enter the vehicle when the vehicle is stopped.
- If someone else picks up your child, please explain the Pick Up and Drop Off Zone procedure with them.
- Talk to your child about what to do if you are not there.
- Children take notice of what you do, so set a good example by behaving safely – obey the parking signs and restrictions around schools.
- Consider the safety of other children as well as your own.
