




Things to Remember

History/Geography

We will be learning how people, places and environments interact, past and present. Children will have the opportunity to expand their world knowledge and learn about the significance of environments, examining how people's need and want of resources over time has affected peoples, societies and environments. This will also enable them to develop inquiry questions such as:

• What were the short- and long-term effects of European settlement on the local environment and Indigenous land and water management practices?

• What is the significance of the environment and what are different views on how it can be used and sustained, past and present?

Towards the end of the term we will be going on an excursion to the Adelaide Botanical Gardens to make the children more aware of how indigenous people used their environment in a sustainable manner.
